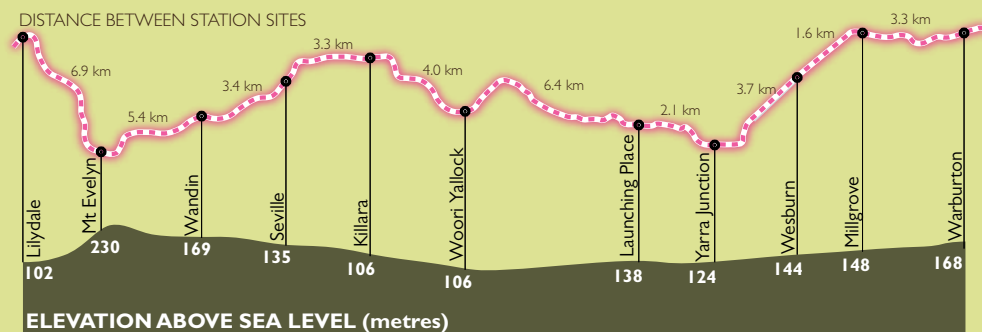


Lilydale to Warburton Rail Trail

- **LOCATION** - Yarra Ranges, 40km east of Melbourne
- **STARTS** - Lilydale Station, Maroondah Hwy (Melway 38 E4)
- **FINISHES** - Behind the Warburton Waterwheel, Station Rd (Melway 290 B4)
- **DISTANCE** - 38km one way, 76km return
- **GRADIENT** - Gentle slope up to and down from Mt Evelyn then mostly flat
- **SURFACE** - Mostly hard packed gravel with bridge and road crossings. The last 3km to Warburton is sealed.
- **SUITABLE FOR** - All levels of fitness and families. This trail can be used by some wheel chairs but please be conscious of the surface, gradients and road crossings.
- **FOOD & DRINK** - There are many eateries in the townships which the trail passes. There are also several unique cafes situated right on the trail at Mt Evelyn, Seville and Warburton.

The Lilydale to Warburton Rail Trail is one of Australia's iconic Rail Trails which meanders through the Yarra Valley between the Dandenong Ranges and the Great Dividing Range.

The 38km recreation trail for walkers, cyclists and horse riders follows the path of the historical railway line which was established in the 1900's to service the agricultural industry of the time.

Take the time to enjoy the spectacular views of the Yarra Ranges National Park, pass through beautiful bushland, wineries and farmlands.

Located only one hour from Melbourne by car or train, the 'Warby Trail' is a great place to visit on a day trip or why not stay overnight in a bed and breakfast. Stop in any of the townships along the way to experience the local produce and discover what the Yarra Valley is all about.

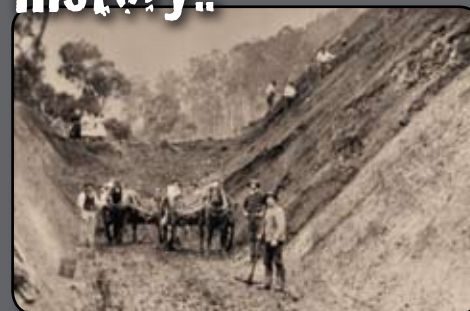

The Trail near Woori Yallock

History..



Constructed by pick and shovel in an astonishing 18 months, the Warburton Railway was completed in 1901 to carry fruit and vegetables from the Wandin farmlands in the foothills of the Dandenong's to Melbourne. Trains also took timber from the forests of Warburton and Powelltown. It used to be claimed that Yarra Junction was second only to Seattle, USA, in the volume of timber passing along its tracks.



The 1960's and 1970's, due to the increased use of automobiles and low passenger numbers, saw the end of the railway and it was closed down and dismantled. For some time the land where the railway once stood was left vacant. During the 1980's a group of residents identified this land would make the perfect location for a Rail Trail.

After spending some time lobbying with Local and State governments a Committee of Management was formed and construction began in 1996. With great excitement the Lilydale to Warburton Rail Trail was officially opened in 1998 as a shared use recreational trail.

Over the years the 'Warby Rail Trail' as it is affectionately known, has further developed with the Yarra Ranges Council now the Committee of Management. In 2011 the 'missing link', being the connecting bridge over the Maroondah Highway in Lilydale, was constructed and officially opened.

Code of conduct..

For your safety and enjoyment whilst using the trail please observe the following:

- Dogs must be on lead & under control at all times
- Please pick up after your dog
- Cross roads with care
- No motorbikes or unauthorised vehicles are allowed on the trail
- Respect the environment, take your rubbish home & do not damage or remove vegetation
- Always keep left and let others past
- This is a shared use trail for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders, please respect each other
- Notify others of your approach when on a bicycle or horse
- Respect private property, do not disturb neighbours or their stock
- Help farmers by leaving the gates as you find them & give way to stock crossing
- Do not climb bridge handrails

CAUTION

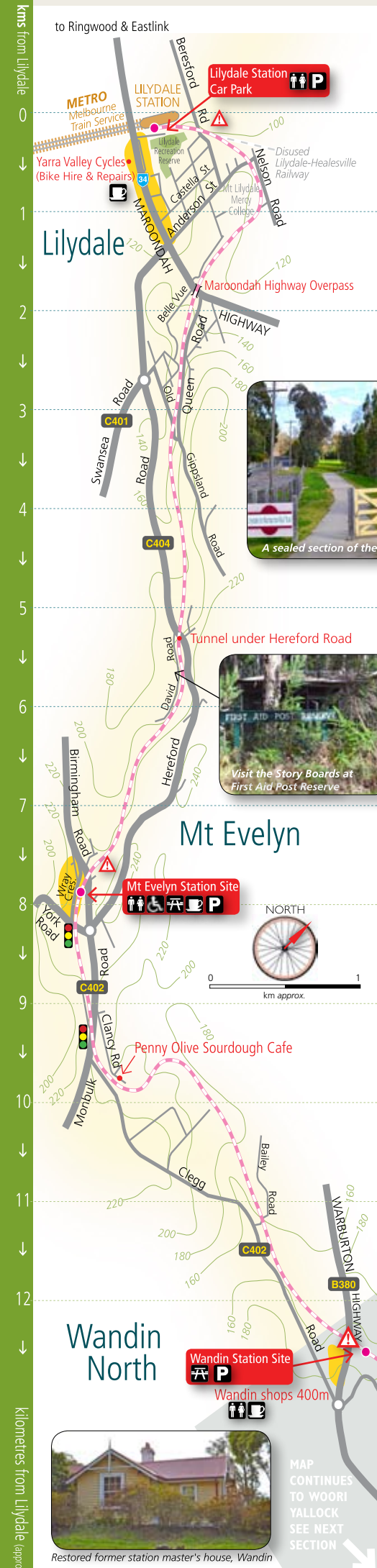
The Lilydale to Warburton Rail Trail is 38km in total length ONEWAY.

- Cycling this distance takes 4 hours ONE WAY for a person of good fitness
- Only attempt distances within your capabilities
- Always carry water and avoid hot periods of the day
- Always visit the CFA website for current fire danger ratings and bushfire warnings.
- Wear appropriate footwear and clothing for your chosen activity and the weather
- Don't forget your helmet if riding



The Warburton section

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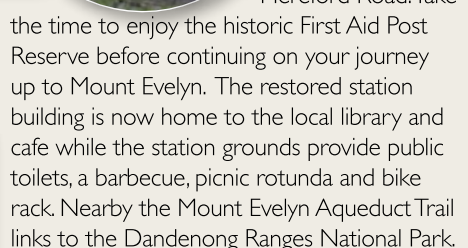


Lilydale - Mount Evelyn 6.9km

The trail begins at the rear of the Lilydale Railway Station car park, with ample all day parking available. Enter the Recreation Reserve to the right and cross the Olinda Creek Bridge to start your journey. Follow the trail past the original Turn Table and around Mt Lilydale Mercy College. Cross the impressive Maroondah Highway Overpass to make your way up into delightful bushland surroundings.



After crossing Gippsland Road, the trail continues up the hill and through the tunnel under Waverford Road Take



Mt Evelyn



Mount Evelyn - Wandin 5.4km

From Mount Evelyn the trail heads downhill to Wandin, crossing the busy Monbulk Road where thousands of people once stood to wave the Queen on her journey in the Royal carriage to Warburton back in 1956. At Bailey Road and Stringybark Creek you will cross the first of many restored rail bridges. Cross the Warburton Highway with care and enter the Wandin Station Site. The entrance gates and the platform have been restored and the Rotary interpretation shelter provides interesting information on the trail. There is ample car parking with picnic areas. The Wandin Township shops, cafes and toilets are just a short diversion up the highway for you to refuel your energy stocks.

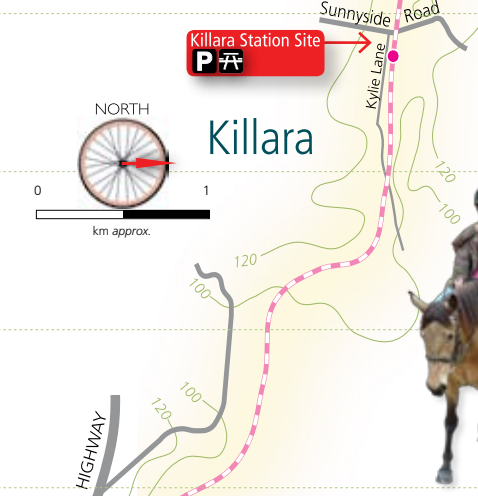

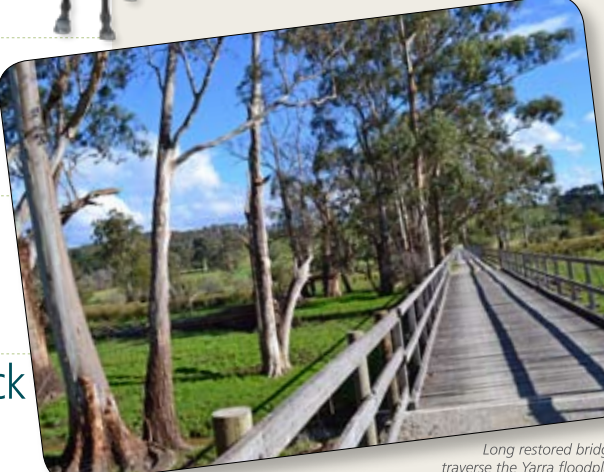
Wandin - Seville 3.4km

The trail continues to offer views out over Wandin North whilst skirting the hilly country as it crosses Seibre Avenue, Burgi Hill Road and Victoria Road. This section travels through large agricultural areas. An interesting side trip will have you divert from the trail to the Seville Township, following the Wandin Yallock Creek. Cool off at the unique Seville Water Play Park which offers toilets, parking, barbeque and picnic facilities. Stop to admire the old railway carriage which has been beautifully restored as the Carriage Cafe. Back on the main trail, cross Victoria Road to find Seville Station on the left with the original platform supports still remaining and a small car park.

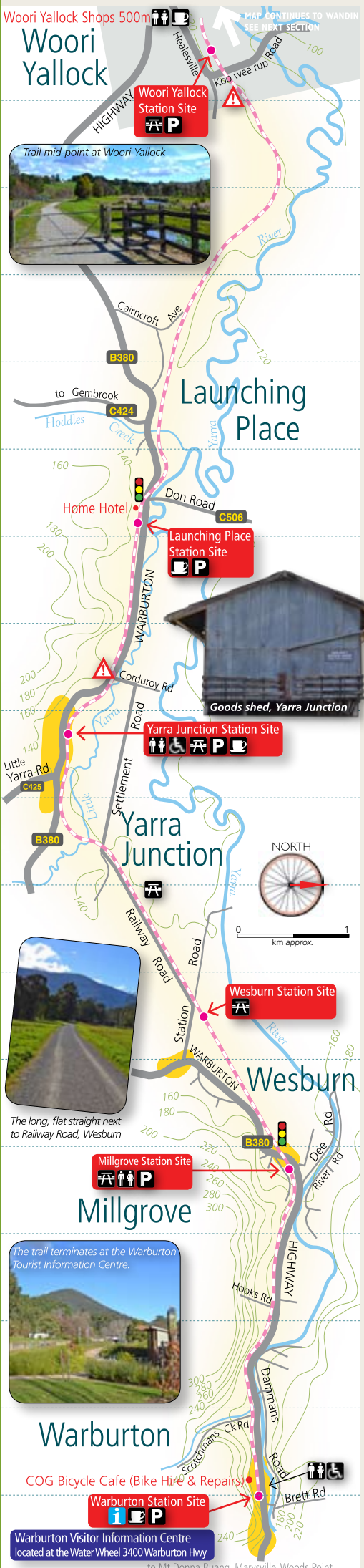


Killara - Woori Yallock 4km

Killara - Woori Yallock 4km
From Killara the trail continues its slow descent to the Yarra River-Valley floodplain. Enjoy vistas across grazing country, to the central highlands of Mounts Riddell and Donna Buang. Cross over the Woori Yallock Creek on the old restored 175m long bridge. The Woori Yallock Station is a popular starting point for equestrian riders and those not wanting to complete the whole trail. This spot provides picnic areas and there is ample room for horse-float parking, not to mention beautiful views of the valley. The Woori Yallock Township is 500m up the hill providing amenities and refreshments.

Woori Yallock - Launching Place 6.4km

Cross the Koo Wee Rup-Healesville Road and swing past rural areas along the banks of the Yarra River in an area known as The Don Valley. Once over Hoddles Creek, the trail hugs the valley wall, passing through a cutting and over the busy Warburton Highway (cross with care) to enter Launching Place. A large car park sits next to the Home Hotel and in front of the remaining station platform.

Launching Place -Yarra Junction 2.1 km


The trail then hugs the southern side of the valley, crosses Warburton Highway at Corduroy Road and heads into Yarra Junction. This part of the trail is also known as the Centenary Trail and was one of the first sections of the 'Rail Trail' to be opened. Within Yarra Junction the trail leads past the Upper Yarra Museum, which is housed in the original Lilydale Station Building. Continuing through the township the trail travels between the bubbling Little Yarra River and a large recreation precinct with parking and public toilets. Just above the trail you'll find community markets, eateries and accommodation.

Yarra Junction - Millgrove 5.2km

After crossing several restored bridges the trail travels into the floodplain offering magnificent views of the Yarra Ranges National Park. The trail then leads past the Wesburn wetlands which attract a variety of water birds. Further along it reaches Millgrove Station which sits close to parking, picnic facilities, public toilets and the Warburton Highway crossing.

Millgrove - Warburton 3.3km











The last leg of the journey takes you through highly vegetated native forests along side the Little Yarra River. This stretch of trail is sealed and follows a gentle gradient up into the riverside township of Warburton. Your journey will conclude at the station site which sits behind the Warburton Visitor Information Centre and near the COG Cafe. Close-by are many towns including the O'Shannassy Aqueduct Trail. The picturesque township has plenty of cafes, accommodation, parking and a public bus service.
